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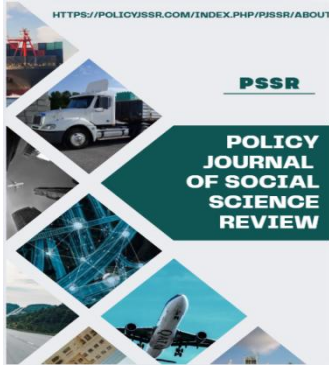
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ABSTRACT

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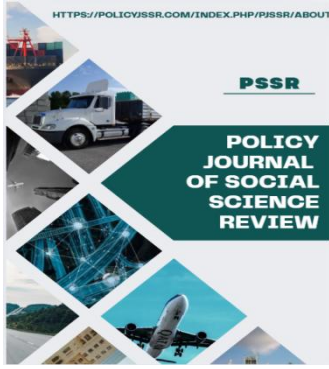
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Introduction

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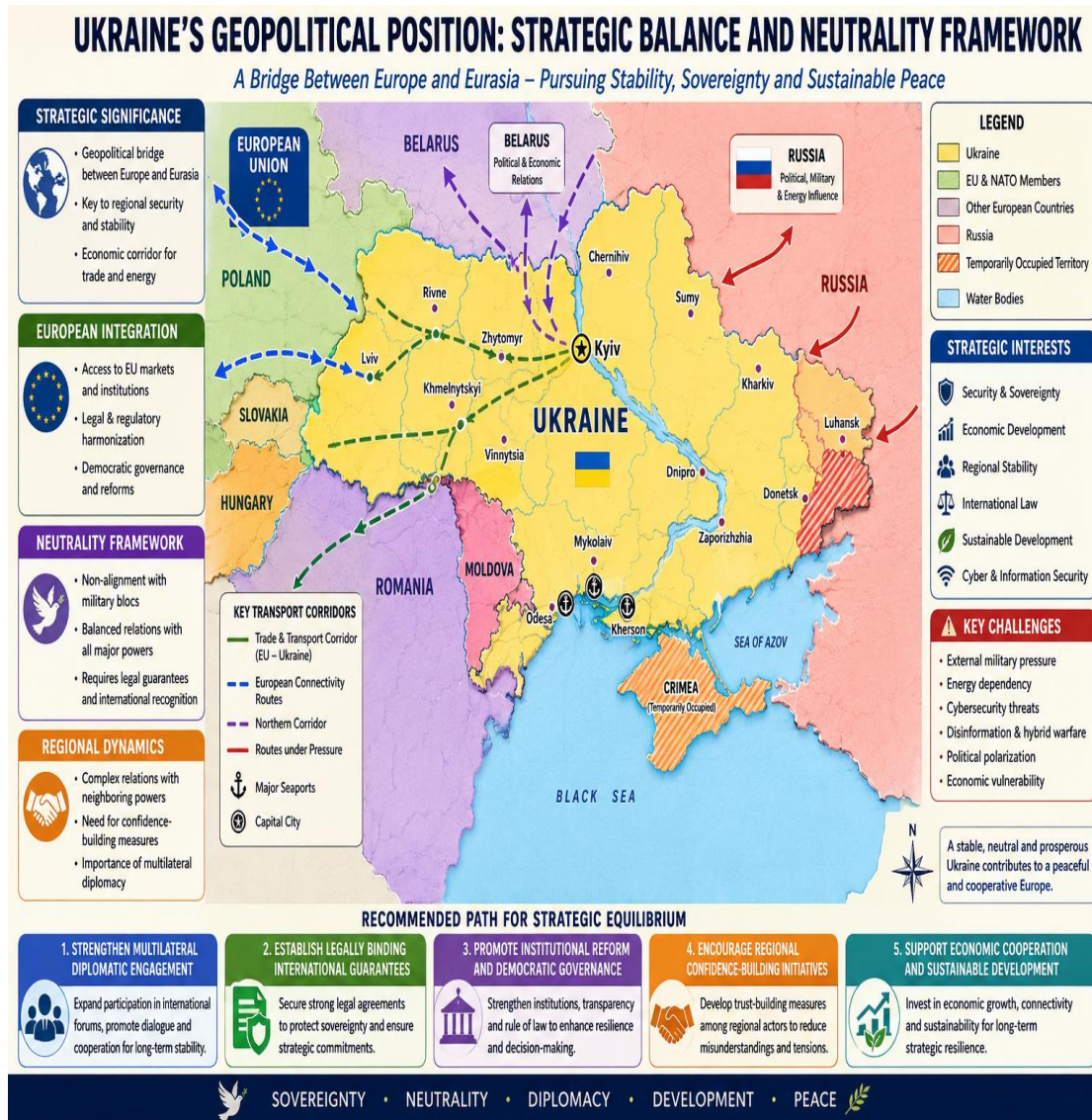
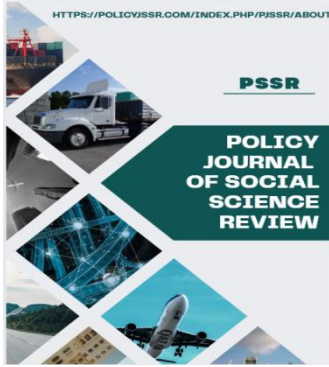

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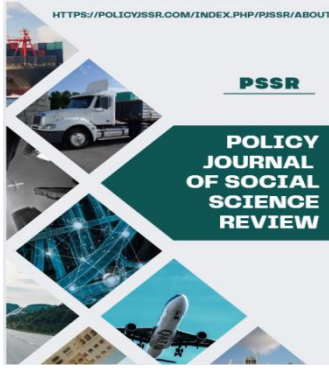
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Literature Review

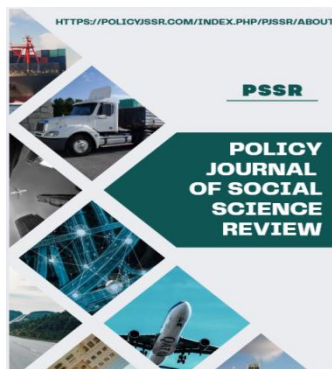
European Integration and Strategic Balance

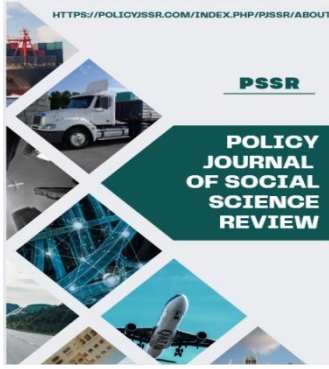

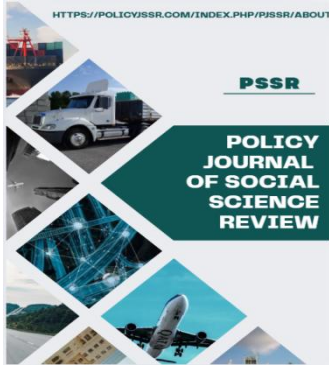

Future Policy Recommendations

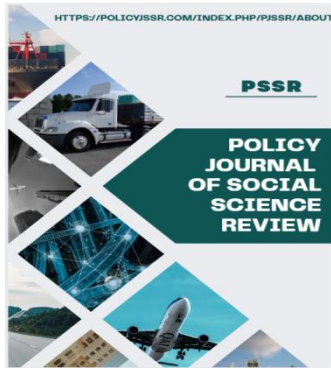

Economic modernization and sustainable development must be prioritized to



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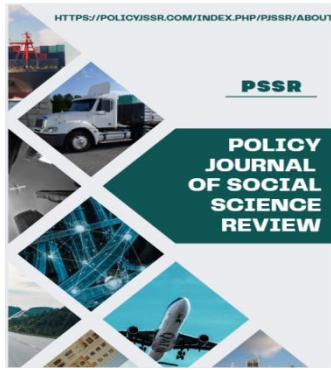
strengthen national independence and strategic resilience. A stable economic foundation will support sovereign policy choices and long-term regional equilibrium.

Emerging challenges such as cyber competition, technological transformation, and shifting geopolitical alignments demand flexible and forward-looking policy responses. Domestic political cohesion remains vital for sustaining policy consistency and international credibility. Effective governance must therefore integrate national consensus with evidence-based strategic planning. The study emphasizes that future stability depends upon combining legal modernization with innovative diplomatic mechanisms. Long-term regional equilibrium requires collaborative international engagement and proactive institutional reform. Ultimately, Ukraine's strategic success will depend upon adaptive statecraft capable of safeguarding sovereignty while promoting



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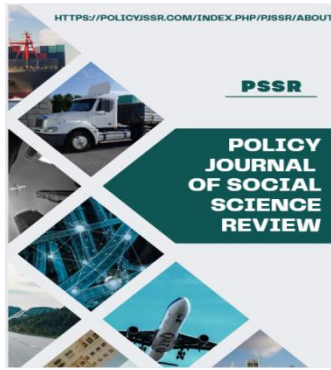
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cooperative international stability. This research affirms that a modern, resilient, and diplomatically balanced framework offers the most sustainable pathway toward regional peace and strategic continuity.

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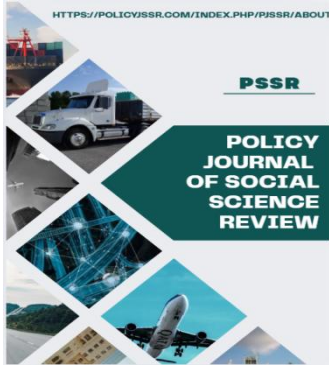


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
